Effective December 28, 2020, the Fund's name was changed from FPA U.S. Value Fund, Inc. to FPA U.S. Core Equity Fund, Inc. and the Fund adopted the S&P 500 as a formal benchmark.

³ As of most recent prospectus, the Investment Advisory Agreement ("IAA") between the Fund and First Pacific Advisors, LP ("FPA" or the "Adviser"), the Fund's investment adviser, requires FPA to reduce its investment advisory fee to the extent necessary to reimburse the Fund for any annual expenses (exclusive of interest, taxes, the cost of brokerage and research services, legal expenses related to portfolio securities, and extraordinary expenses such as litigation, merger, reorganization or recapitalization) in excess of 1.5% of the first \$30 million and 1% of the remaining average net assets of the Fund. This agreement is coterminous with the IAA, and the IAA is as of October 1. The IAA may be terminated by the Board or by the vote of a majority of the Fund's shareholders or the Adviser.

⁴ FPA U.S. Core Equity Fund performance is net of all fees and expenses and includes the reinvestment of distributions. Periods over one year are annualized. Fund returns do not reflect the deduction of taxes that a shareholder would pay on Fund distributions or the redemption of Fund shares, which would lower these figures.

⁵ Previously, on September 1, 2015, the Fund changed its name to FPA U.S. Value Fund, Inc., and the current portfolio manager assumed management of the Fund on that date. Contemporaneous with this change, the Fund transitioned to its current investment strategy. Performance prior to September 1, 2015 reflects the performance of the prior portfolio manager and investment strategy. Performance prior to September 1, 2015 is not indicative of performance for any subsequent periods. The transition took place during time period from September 1, 2015-September 30, 2015.

⁹ 12-Month Trailing and Forward Price to Earnings (P/E) are calculated using weighted harmonic averaging, which helps avoid extreme results that may occur due to small relative numbers.

¹⁰ Price/Book ratio is the market price of a stock divided by the book value per share.

¹¹ Return on Equity measures a corporation's profitability by revealing how much profit a company generates with the money shareholders have invested.

¹² Debt/Equity is the measure of a company's financial leverage calculated by dividing its total liabilities by stockholder's equity.

¹³ Debt/Capital is the measure of a company's financial leverage calculated by dividing its total liabilities by its total capital.
