Investment objective

Vanguard Mega Cap Index Fund seeks to track the performance of a benchmark index that measures investment return of the largest-capitalization stocks in the United States.

Investment strategy

The fund employs a “passive management”—or indexing-investment approach designed to track the performance of the CRSP US Mega Cap Index, a broadly diversified index of stocks of the largest U.S. companies. The fund attempts to replicate the target index by investing all, or substantially all, of its assets in the stocks that make up the index, holding each stock in approximately the same proportion as its weighting in the index.

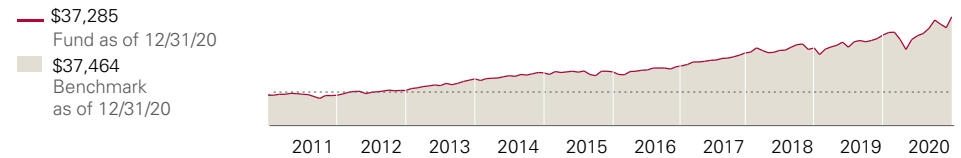

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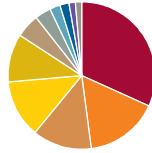

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Plain talk about risk

The fund is subject to several kinds of risk, so an investor could lose money over short or even extended periods. The main risks of investing in the fund are:

Stock market risk: The chance that stock prices overall will decline. Stock markets tend to move in cycles, with periods of rising stock prices and periods of falling stock prices. The fund's target index may, at times, become focused in stocks of a particular sector, category, or group of companies. Because the fund seeks to track its target index, the fund may underperform the overall stock market.

Investment style risk: The chance that returns from large-capitalization stocks will trail returns from the overall stock market. Large-cap stocks tend to go through cycles of doing better—or worse—than other segments of the stock market or the stock market in general. These periods have, in the past, lasted for as long as several years.
